## What is Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)?

Any abusive or coercive act used to gain and maintain power and control over an intimate partner

A pattern of behavior exercised throughout the relationship

May occur regardless of race, age, sexual identity, socioeconomic level, education background etc...

Results in the survivor changing their behavior.



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
### Just a few facts...

- •An estimated 324,000 pregnant people in the US are physically assaulted by their intimate partner each year.
- Women abused during pregnancy are more likely to delay initiation of prenatal care and more likely to receive no prenatal care at all.
- •Women who experience IPV are about 3X more likely to suffer perinatal death than women who do not experience IPV.
- •63% of female homicide victims were killed by an intimate partner in cases where the victim knew the perpetrator.
- •Homicide is a leading cause of death for pregnant and postpartum women, accounting for 31% of maternal injury deaths.
- •Infants exposed to IPV can show signs of trauma, including eating problems, sleep disturbances, higher irritability, and delays in development.




Stage 1:

Risk Factors for Intimate Partner Violence

### Individual Risk Factors

- Witnessing violence between parents as a child
- History of experiencing poor parenting or physical discipline as a child
- Jealousy or possessiveness regarding partner

#### Relationship Risk Factors

- Dominance / control of the relationship by one partner over the other
- Financial stress and conflict
- Unhealthy family relationships / interactions

### Community Risk Factors

- High rates of unemployment & poverty
- Hight rates of violence in general
- Weak community sanctions ie unwillingness of neighbors to intervene

#### Societal Risk Factors

- Rigid gender roles
- Gender inequity
- Norms that support aggressive behavior towards others
- Weak health, education, economic and social policies

### Protective Factors Against Intimate Partner Violence

#### Relationship Protective Factors

- Strong familial and social support networks
- Stable positive relationships with other individuals outside of intimate partner

### Community Protective Factors

- Neighborhood connectedness
- Access to safe stable housing
- Access to appropriate medical and mental health care
- Access to economic assistance
- Coordination of resources and services among community

### Survivor Impacts of Intimate Partner Violence •Physical Impacts

- Traumatic injury~ bruises, broken bones, weaponinflicted injuries
- Psychosomatic Symptoms; Headaches, Muscle pain, Gastrointestinal disorders
- Mismanaged chronic health conditions
- Gynecological issues;
  - Intentional exposure to STIs
  - · Trauma resulting from sexual coercion or assault
  - · Reproductive coercion or birth control sabotage
- Pregnancy problems;
  - Poor weight gain during pregnancy
  - · Anemia
  - Infection
  - · Inadequate prenatal care
  - Preterm delivery
  - · Assault during pregnancy causing fetal injury

Survivor Impacts of Intimate Partner Violence
•Psychological & Emotional Impacts

- Depression
- Anxiety
- Low self-esteem
- Post Traumatic Stress Disorder
- Substance Use Disorder
- Fear of intimacy
- Suicidal ideation



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### What are you going to see?

Survivor Impacts of Intimate Partner Violence
•Social Impacts

- Lack of support network
- Difficulty maintaining relationships
- Restricted access to resources and information
